ST. AUGUSTINE, GENERAL INFORMATION As of February, 2024

This is a partial listing of important names and places associated with St. Augustine.

- 1) Henry Flagler was instrumental in developing St. Augustine as a tourist destination back in the late 1880's. Along with John D. Rockefeller, Flagler earned his fortune by establishing what became the Standard Oil Company. The architecture that he favored was Spanish Renaissance, and the city includes many beautiful Spanish-style buildings. - 2) The Menorcans This refers to a large group of people from the Mediterranean (the Spanish island of Menorca, Italy, Greece) who immigrated in 1768 to Florida where they worked as indentured servants on an indigo plantation in New Smyrna. Conditions were terrible, and about 600 of the survivors made the difficult 75-mile journey on foot to settle in St. Augustine in 1777. Many of the Menorcan surnames are well known in St. Augustine (Carrera, Manucy, Masters, Pacetti, Pellicer, Pomar, Ponce, Usina, Ximenez, etc.). The descendants of these early settlers have preserved their heritage and have played an important role in our area. The Menorcans (also spelled Minorcans) brought with them their famous datil pepper and are known for their version of pilaf called pilau and Menorcan clam chowder.

3) Flagler College - 74 King St., 904-823-3378, www.flagler.edu

What is now **Flagler College** was once the **Hotel Ponce de Leon**, Flagler's first hotel in Florida. The hotel opened in January 1888 and was designed to attract the super wealthy who started coming down to Florida to spend the winters. Flagler achieved his ambitious plans to develop tourism in Florida by building hotels and the railroad extending all the way down the east coast to the Florida Keys. His friend **Thomas Alva Edison** installed the electricity (something very new in the 1880's) in his St. Augustine hotels, and another friend **Louis Comfort Tiffany** was contracted as interior designer. Tiffany designed the beautiful stained-glass windows in the Ponce de Leon dining room. Flagler opened Florida for tourism, spending much of his personal fortune to do so. Tickets for the daily tours must be reserved, and tours are currently scheduled at 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 3 p.m. Check online for tickets and any changes in the schedule.

4) The Lightner Museum - 75 King St., 904-824-2874, www.lightnermuseum.org

This was the second hotel built by Flagler, and it's right across the street from Flagler College. Called the Hotel Alcázar, opened on Christmas day in 1888, it featured many recreational opportunities. At that time, it had the largest indoor swimming pool in the world, an elegant ballroom, a bowling alley, tennis courts, a bicycle riding academy, a golf course nearby, horseback riding, and a health spa with a Turkish bath, a Russian bath, a cold plunge pool, a gymnasium and massage room. It closed as a hotel in 1931, and in 1948 it was converted into the Lightner Museum that now houses a wide variety of collections (fine art, American brilliant cut glass, folk art, furniture, etc.) and a gift shop with a great selection of interesting items. Otto Lightner, a wealthy magazine publisher in Chicago, came to St. Augustine in 1946 and stayed in the Ponce de Leon. Lightner had amassed a huge number of artifacts, artwork, furniture, and collections of various items during the Great Depression. When he saw the empty former hotel, he bought the building to showcase his collections and opened it as a museum in 1948. The museum has undergone many renovations, restoring it to its original beauty. The former pool now houses the Alcazar Café.

5) The Villa Zorayda - 83 King St., 904-829-9887, www.villazorayda.com

This beautiful building, just a block down from the Lightner Museum, now a museum, was originally built as the winter home of Franklin W. Smith, a wealthy hardware merchant from Boston. The architecture mirrors a section of the **Alhambra**, a beautiful Moorish palace in Granada, Spain. Smith was the first to use the **poured concrete** method of construction, which was later used by Flagler. Villa Zorayda is open with self-guided audio tours available.

6) Ripley's Believe It or Not - 19 San Marco Ave., 904-824-1606, www.ripleys.com

This is the first **Ripley's Believe It or Not**, and it is housed in the former winter home of William Warden, a business partner of Henry Flagler and John D. Rockefeller. The Moorish Revival home was built in 1887 and became a hotel in 1941. Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings (a popular American writer, author of *The Yearling*) once owned and ran the hotel. Robert S. Ripley (famous cartoonist and world traveler) stayed in the hotel and tried to buy it for his first museum. His family purchased it after his death and opened the museum in 1950.

7) The Fountain of Youth - 11 Magnolia Ave., 904-829-3168, www.fountainofyouthflorida.com

This offers a great deal of interesting history with many activities for children. Peacocks wander around freely, and there is a good gift shop where small bottles of water from the Fountain of Youth and other Florida-related items can be purchased.

8) The Alligator Farm - 999 Anastasia Blvd., 904-824-3337, www.alligatorfarm.com

There are close to 800 alligators, and it's interesting to see them being fed. It's also a mini zoo with many different types of exotic animals including the lemurs of Madagascar. The rookery is huge and attracts a large variety of beautiful birds. There's also a zip line over the alligators for those adventurous enough to try it.

9) Castillo de San Marcos - 11 S Castillo Dr. 904-829-6506, www.nps.gov/casa/index.htm

Standing sentry over St. Augustine, the formidable Castillo de San Marcos is the oldest masonry fort in the continental US. Positioned strategically on Matanzas Bay, the fort, started in 1672, was built by the Spanish to protect the town. The fort played a pivotal role in protecting Spanish St. Augustine from the 1700's to the late 1800's. In 1924, the Castillo, or Fort Marion as it was known at the time, was declared a national monument by President Calvin Coolidge. The fort is open daily and musket or cannon demonstrations take place on most weekends.

10) Classic Car Museum of St. Augustine - 4730 Dixie Hwy., 904-806-4610, www.ccmstaug.com

This museum provides visitors with the opportunity to experience cars from the 1800's to modern day sports cars. Check the website for scheduled special events.

11) <u>Trolley Tours</u> - The trolley ride takes a little over an hour, and you learn a lot about the history of the city, with stops along the way. St. Johns County residents get a special discount (buy one, get one free) at the **Old Town Trolley** (904-203-8655). Apply first for the **Hometown Pass** to get the discount for the trolley and several other attractions (<u>www.hometownpass.com</u>). **Ripley's Red Train** (904-829-6545) offers 50% off for residents or buy one, get one half off for two seniors (55 and

older). The trolleys run throughout the day and are hop-on-hop-off, so you can explore areas of interest before completing the tour.

12) <u>Downtown St. Augustine</u> – The city is historically important with a great deal of interesting architecture and several small museums and galleries that are worth seeing. **St. George Street** is the main pedestrian street, but there are many nice little streets to explore.

With the app you can park all day at the Parking Garage for only \$3 (instead of \$20). The app also gives you a discount rate of 50 cents at all public metered parking, and you can add time to the meter remotely.
